Humboldt Involves Youth in Planning

Humboldt PRIDE is expanding its work in community improvement using the PRIDE Healthy Ecosystems -Healthy Communities (HEHC) program. On Oct 23, 2010, Humboldt's PRIDE group held their first public meeting to invite their



community to participate in their HEHC project.

The meeting attracted Humboldt students, teachers, members of the local government and garden club and citizens interested in stabilizing the stream banks of the Neosho River and protecting habitat for local wildlife. The meeting was co-facilitated by the HEHC Coordinator, Sherry Davis, and Barbara Chalker-Anderson from the Kansas Department of Commerce Office of Rural Opportunity.

According to Sunny Shreeve and Vada Aikens, Humboldt, they had "good feedback on the meeting" and had "lots of good input" from the 33 people that attended the meeting. The group identified what they valued about living in their community and named 38 natural resource and community assets that make Humboldt a very special place to live.

Building on the citizens' appreciation of their community and the great outdoors, participants were asked to envision an award that they would like to see their community receive for their HEHC work. From river bank restoration to environmental education and a national peace treaty for all river life, this community could indeed (Wow!) see a future made brighter from their work to protect their natural resources and water quality. 2011 Get It - Do It! Applications are Now Available and are due February 1, 2011

Get It - Do It! begins its fourth year of supporting youth and adult partnerships to promote health. Click here for an application.

Since 2008, Get It - Do It! has provided PRIDE communities with \$3,000 grants to engage youth in local health promotion planning and project implementation. In order to successfully compete for funds in 2011, PRIDE community groups will need to:

- Work with local Extension agents and youth to prepare their applications
- Submit their applications by February 1, 2011
- Meet with Get It Do It! staff between February 15 -25 for a prefunding visit to their community

Applicants are also encouraged to involve schools and youth organizations (e.g, 4-H clubs, FFA, Scouts, FCCLA, recreation groups) in their applications. Selection of the 2011 Get It - Do It! communities will be announced March 1, 2011.

Washington PRIDE off to a great start

Washington's newly formed PRIDE committee was started last summer. They got off to a fast start by conducting a needs assessment and determined priorities to be: enhancing the physical environment of the community; expanding the performing arts; improving youth and senior centers and creating social activities for all ages.

The PRIDE group has met on a weekly basis since their inception. Their first project was raising money for food boxes for the needy during the Christmas season. Members visited service clubs and private individuals in a concerted effort to raise monies. These efforts raised \$2,500 for the food box project. One hundred boxes were filled with basic food supplies and

distributed to individuals and families who requested assistance.

Sherry Davis, Program Coordinator for HEHC, will be sharing further details of the HEHC program and what it takes to get started.

News You Can Use. . .

Making the most of your quarterly reports

Thanks to all of the communities who sent in their quarterly reports for the last quarter of the 2010 calendar year. You continue to do an amazing job of volunteering in your community. To date we've had

28 communities submit a report for a total of 9,951 volunteer hours. To translate those hours into dollars, the Independent Sector places a value of \$20.85 per hour on volunteer time. That equals a total of \$207,478.35. Wow! That is a real impact for your rural communities. Make sure you use this information as you visit with key stakeholders in your community. By multiplying your volunteer hours times the hourly rate of \$20.85 you have the volunteer contribution PRIDE has made to your community. Add this to the results of the projects and you have a great story to share.

Are they public or private dollars?

With each quarterly report, we ask that you tell us the dollars received through public and private sources. Public funds are tax based and include all money received from a unit of government, including State or Federal grants. Private funds are those dollars received from individuals, families, corporations, private foundations and most other fund raising.

For example, a community receives grant funds from their watershed district. These would be considered public dollars as the watershed is funded through federal dollars. If a community were to receive funds from a local community foundation, these would be considered private dollars as they received their funds from individuals, families or corporations.

You are probably wondering why we're asking for this information. This information is important to key stakeholders as it reflects how communities are leveraging their public dollars with private dollars to carry out successful projects.

Your youth partners are important to us

The quarterly report form for 2011 has a couple of slight changes. This year we are asking you to check the projects and collaborations which include youth. We know that youth who volunteer within a community develop a greater sense of belonging resulting in increased youth retention. Tracking this information helps PRIDE measure those efforts. PRIDE Capital Project Awards

March 1 is the deadline to submit nominations for the Capital Project Awards. These awards are designed to recognize communities who have done excellent work developing community capitals. Local PRIDE programs are encouraged to nominate a high quality project for state-level recognition



which reflects their work in a community capital area. Nominations may be submitted in all seven capitals as long as you use a separate project nomination form and a different project for each capital. Projects must have been completed between July 1, 2009 and December 31, 2010. Initiation of the project may have occurred prior to July 1, 2009. The Kansas PRIDE Awards Information and Nomination Packet includes the awards criteria along with the nomination form.

LeonardvillePromoting Physical Activity

Through park improvements, Leonardville is creating a place where adults and children of all ages are able to increase physical activity, play together and enrich family life which will help sustain the rural community.



A three phase park improvement plan was developed with phase one, the development of a walking trail, completed in 2010. Phase two, the addition of fenced-in-kiddie equipment for ages 2-5, will be added in 2011, and phase three, equipment for youth ages 5-12, will soon follow.

With support from the city, Bayer Construction, and Riley County Parks Department, the only cost associated with the development of the trail was fuel for the skid loader and tractor. What an accomplishment!

Keeping the goal of promoting physical activity in mind, fund raising

efforts for phase two have included a softball and golf tournament.

Four PRIDE Communities Receive SCIP Grants

Congratulations are extended to Ashland, Larned, McFarland and Tampa for their success in receiving Small Community Improvement Program (SCIP) grants from the Kansas Department of Commerce (Commerce).

One of the requirements to receive funding is the communities determining what pieces of the project they can complete by themselves. The community acts as the general contractor, organizing local labor and equipment, as well as coordinating work that needs to be done by a subcontractor. The Commerce staff provides direction, technical assistance, guidance and support. The sweat equity and volunteer hours must save at least 40 percent of the project's normal marketplace cost.

The grants were awarded to these communities for the following projects:

Larned (\$125,000) - Renovations to Doerr-Vernon Park Ashland (\$75,617) - Building a new community fitness center McFarland (\$70,102) - Improvements and new equipment for the city park Tampa (\$64,126) - Building a new city park

rampa (\$04,120) - Ballaling a new city park

Grinnell Receives BlueCHIP® Award

Three communities that differ by size and geography have one important thing in common; each has taken steps to improve the health of its residents and in the process, has earned a BlueCHIP® Award from Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Kansas (BCBSKS) and the Kansas Recreation and Park Association (KRPA). The cities of Lawrence, Hutchinson and Grinnell each received a check for \$2,500.

BlueCHIP is a community health improvement program created to recognize and reward Kansas communities who encourage and support healthy lifestyles through programs, initiatives, policies and/or community-wide events.

"These communities - Lawrence, Hutchinson and Grinnell - are all doing phenomenal work and were selected for their collaboration with a variety of organizations, their programs that are changing infrastructures and for involving community citizens of all ages," said Marlou Wegener, BCBSKS manager of community relations. "These three communities serve as outstanding examples of what happens when individuals in a community come together to work

2011 Get It! Do It! Recipients

Seven small towns have been awarded Get It - Do It! grants for 2011. The \$3,000 grants, which support youth-adult partnerships that promote community health were awarded to: Alton, Council Grove, Glasco, Grainfield, Grinnell, Mt. Hope and Smith Center. Projects range from Alton building a skate park and engaging the "White Chocolate" company of Hays, KS to establish skate events for surrounding communities to Smith Center's design and construction of a nature/fitness trail.

The towns were selected after a competitive review of proposals and site visits by K-State Research and Extension personnel. In order to be awarded the funds, each community had to demonstrate:

- active involvement and decision-making of youth
- desire to support positive youth-adult partnerships
- projects designed to address the "cornerstones" of Community Health
- Kansas PRIDE members in good standing

Additionally, local Extension agents were required to be involved in the development of the grant proposals and to participate in the community youth development projects should they be funded. Agents sharing in the awards are: Laura Marks (Morris County), Sarah Molzhan (Post Rock Dist.), Pat Gerhardt (River Valley Dist.), Sandra Wick (Smith County), Bev Dunning (Sedgwick County) and Jennifer Schoenfeld (Gove County).

Building on partnerships between PRIDE, youth organizations and local K- State Research and Extension, these communities not only get-it-and-do-it (get the money and do the project), they impact the wellness of those living in their communities moving towards not only healthy people but also healthy communities. This has a long term impact for all.

What is a Resolution of Government Support?

The PRIDE Resolution of Government Support is a document that is required by the Kansas PRIDE Program. Because PRIDE is a collaborative effort between citizens and local government, we have created a "statement of intent" which reaffirms the strong working relationship between changing PRIDE volunteers and city government.

A Resolution of Government Support:

- formalizes the support of the community volunteer group by your local government
- sustains the awareness of local government to your past and future volunteer efforts
- lets your community maintain its' affiliation with the Kansas PRIDE Program

As a requirement for maintaining good standing in the annual PRIDE program, each enrolled community must submit a Resolution of Government Support at the start of each calendar year.

Quarterly Reports: Reflecting Your Community Efforts

Yes, it's that time again. Quarterly reports are due April 15. This report covers the first quarter of the 2011 calendar year. This is new for 2011 since we have shifted the program year to the calendar year. This is now the FIRST quarter of 2011. Quarterly reports are collected by the state PRIDE program to document your hard work and to track the impact of the state program. We are always excited to read about what your PRIDE group has done. Your quarterly reports also help us promote your projects on the PRIDE website and on Facebook.

Reporting should include project work, investment of volunteer hours and your fundraising efforts. From your quarterly reports, the Kansas PRIDE Office is able to report the financial impact of your work. This comes through the investments of public and private donor contributions you record on the reports. In addition to local support, certain funds, such as the KSRE Get It Do It program funds, are awarded exclusively to PRIDE Communities and should also be included. Other community investments, such as Community Development Block Grants, KAN-STEP and Small Community Improvement Grants through the state of Kansas can also be reflected on quarterly reports if your PRIDE group was involved in acquiring these funds. Whether it was through the support of the application, the grant writing process itself or through surveys or gathering of information, these funds should be reflected on your quarterly reports.

It is important to remember that when you submit your quarterly report, you are reflecting the efforts of your community. You are telling the story of your community and what has happened in the last few months. Sometimes things are slow, sometimes things are hectic, but when your numbers are not reported, an accurate picture of your efforts cannot be realized by outside eyes. Opportunities to gain support might be lost. Ideas and connections concerning your community efforts might be overlooked.

Quarterly reports are more than mere numbers. They are a tool that can be used to reflect your hard work. Don't forget to record your youth involvement and project collaborators. Click here for the quarterly report form.

Community Resource Act (CRA) Grants

Community Resource Act (CRA) grants help communities in Kansas organize their own community education programs.

The University for Man (UFM) philosophy and educational programming are models that are used by many communities to develop their own program. UFM Community Learning Center was started in 1968 in Manhattan. Based on the philosophy that everyone can learn and everyone can teach, UFM provides opportunities for lifelong learning and personal development. Community members share their knowledge, hobbies and interests as volunteer instructors for their community's educational program. Class offerings can be on a variety of topics including arts & crafts, recreation, history, earth & nature, health & wellness and much more.

This program provides state mini-grants and technical support for a uniquely Kansas approach to community development and joint learning. The program is designed to meet the educational, recreational, social and cultural needs of a community.

Eligible organizations are local non-profit organizations, institutions, service agencies or groups primarily concerned with the general welfare of the community. These groups must be organized for the purpose of establishing and operating community education programs.

The Community Resource Act (CRA) Program is administered by Kansas State

University, Division of Continuing Education, through UFM Community Learning Center. As an outreach program of UFM and the Division of Continuing Education, CRA strives to promote life-long learning throughout the state of Kansas. **Grant applications are due October 15, 2011**.

Your Communities Choice-Understanding the Current PRIDE Program Options

As we finish the first program year under a new PRIDE Program enrollment structure, there continues to be many questions about enrollment. The current PRIDE program has three enrollment options. Your PRIDE community chooses the option that best fits your situation.

As we all know, community development does not happen in one day. Some PRIDE groups have a specific project focus, while others are working across their community to plan and implement more comprehensive community improvement strategies. The PRIDE program can be utilized to support community improvement efforts at all levels.

To participate in Kansas PRIDE, your community must enroll in the program. To enroll, a PRIDE Community will annually submit a PRIDE Enrollment Form and the city government Resolution of Support to the Kansas PRIDE office. These forms will be due December 15, 2012. A community will designate one of the following enrollment options on this form. Please review the following options as you make plans to enroll in PRIDE for the 2012 program year.

Option 1 - Enroll as a PRIDE Community

Enrollment as a PRIDE Community means you have (or are establishing) an organization for community improvement. This PRIDE organization is partnered with the local government, and has a defined, on-going plan of work. PRIDE programs who might want to choose this option are:

- Newly formed PRIDE Communities that enroll during the current PRIDE program year
- PRIDE Communities in their first few years that were formed to meet a specific need and are completing that project before doing a community wide assessment process
- Any PRIDE Community that is operating from a work plan that was developed several years prior but continues to support the current scope of work based on their desired outcomes

Option 2 - Enroll as a PRIDE STAR Community

A PRIDE STAR Community is a community that already has an effective organization, and your PRIDE group is taking a leadership or active supporting role in helping the community identify and work toward community improvement goals. To enroll as a STAR Community the community must:

- Be in the process of conducting a community assessment to determine the current needs of the community OR
- Have recently conducted a community assessment to determine the needs of the community

Have, or are developing, a vision and mission statement

- Engage the entire community to establish goals
- Plan projects that are based off the assessment and are advancing the community toward their set goals

To enroll in this option in 2012, PRIDE STAR Communities will be ask to submit a Community Self-Assessment to document the above noted requirements.

Enroll as a Community of Excellence

A PRIDE Community of Excellence designation is a recognition from Kansas PRIDE for a community PRIDE program that has demonstrated an exemplary community development process through engaging their community in planned improvement.

In 2012, communities that are eligible to be designated as a Community of Excellence must:

- Have been designated a Community of Excellence in 2009 OR
- Have been enrolled as a STAR Community (option 2) in 2011 and submitted the Essay of Application for Community of Excellence to Kansas PRIDE, Inc. and received an official notice of approval as a Community of Excellence.

Eligible communities who enroll as a Community of Excellence are eligible to submit a proposal for the Partners in PRIDE grant funds. Partners in PRIDE funds are made available by Kansas PRIDE, Inc. to support community projects that are based on a comprehensive community planning process and provide for community sustainability. These are competitive funds and must be matched at the local level. Proposals are accepted for these funds twice a year.

In preparation for the 2012 enrollment year, the PRIDE office will be sending out information to each community that designates what option they enrolled in for 2011 and what needs to be done if they wish to enroll in another option in the future.

Out with the Old-In with the New

As an outreach program of UFM and the Division of Continuing Education, CRA strives to promote life-long learning throughout the state of Kansas.

David Coltrain, River Valley Extension District of Washington County, has supported Washington's PRIDE team and has assisted these community leaders with organization of their PRIDE and HEHC programs to promote citizen investment and protection of water quality and other important community resources.

We put the meeting announcement up on our FaceBook page and we've already got 75-80 people coming to the meeting - anymore and we won't have room for them."

Wow! What a great start to their community effort to protect and restore Camp Pawnee along the Pawnee River. The planning team has already applied for other grants to enhance this 40 acre Boy Scout camp as a recreational resource to create new economic, health and social opportunities for the area.

This initial meeting allowed citizens to distinguish what they value about living in Larned and what their vision is for the future of their community's natural assets.
